Day 53, (First - Tuesday, 11/11/08) At Sea, The Southern Cross, Chocolate Extravaganza

At daybreak there was an overcast sky, calm sea and temperature in the high 70s. We were cruising northeast toward Western Samoa and the island of Upolu. Our destination on Upolu was the capital city of Apia. At the noon navigation report by the captain we were 92 miles from the island of Tonga with 8300 feet of water under the keel. We had 350 miles to go before we reach Apia tomorrow.

Southern Cross: The day started early when Orlin got up about 2am and discovered the sky at that time was clear and stars were shining brightly. We had wanted to see the Southern Cross (Crux) constellation at least once while we were south of the equator and this looked like a good time to go out on deck and try to find it. In another day or two of cruising northward it would not be possible to see the Southern Cross which would be below the horizon. The time for this sighting was growing short. Barbara could not be coaxed out of bed so Orlin went on his own.

The ship has most of the common deck areas well lighted 24 hours a day which hinders star gazing. The only place that is dark enough at night to see the stars clearly is the highest deck of the ship which is on the roof of the Crow's Nest Lounge. From that vantage point the Southern Cross was successfully seen by looking to the south off the starboard side of the ship. It was not possible to photograph the Southern Cross with the digital camera but many images are available on the internet and we copied this one on the right to show what the constellation looks like. One way to help find the constellation in the sky among several possible star combinations is to compare it with the crucifixion cross. In the Southern Cross the vertical part of the cross is about 1.5 times the length of the slightly tilted horizontal bar of a cross. With some satisfaction we could "cross" off another item on our cruise to-do list.



Veteran's Day: About 10am, Bruce, the cruise director came on the PA system to remind the passengers and crew that today was Veteran's Day and the need to keep the sacrifice of our military forces firmly in our minds. He then had the entire ship observe a minute of complete silence as a memorial to fallen service personnel. There are many former military people on board and this moment was appreciated by all.

Deck 3 Cocktails: Diana (lusyrsgirl) called about 4pm and invited us to an impromptu cocktail hour on the Promenade Deck at the stern of the ship. Some of the same people were there who

were at her Halloween Party. It was a good chance to get together with friends and make some new acquaintances. Everyone enjoyed Diana's Deck 3 Happy Hour.
